MANY EARLY BASEBALL GREATS WERE MASONS

The inaugural induction ceremony of the Baseball Hall of Fame took place in Cooperstown, NY, on June 12, 1939 – 76 years ago.

Of the 10 Hall of Famers in attendance at the first induction, 6 were Masons: Ty Cobb, Cy Young, Tris Speaker, Honus Wagner, Eddie Collins, Grover Cleveland Alexander.

The four "Hall" members who were not Brother Masons included Babe Ruth, Walter Johnson, Napoleon Lajoie and George Sisler.

Ty Cobb was a member of Royston Lodge in Georgia, where his father had served as Worshipful Master; Cobb became a Mason in 1907 and was later a Shriner in Michigan. Denton True "Cy" Young was a member of Mystic Tie Lodge in Uhrichsville, Ohio, and was active in Lodge activities until his death; he was also a member of York Rite, Scottish Rite and Shrine.

Tris Speaker was a member of Hubbard City Lodge in Hubbard, Texas. John Honus Wagner was a Life Member of Centennial Lodge in Carniege, Pennsylvania, which he joined in 1919. Eddie Collins was a member of Solomons Lodge in Tarrytown, New York, which he joined in 1911; he demitted in 1921. Grover Cleveland Alexander, became a Master Mason in 1923 in St. Paul Lodge in St. Paul, Nebraska; he was expelled for unMasonic conduct in 1930.

The first class of Hall of Fame members – Cobb, Ruth, Wagner and Johnson was elected in 1936. Young, Speaker, and Lajoie were chosen in 1938; Alexander was added in 1938. Collins and Sisler joined the list in 1938 at the time when the National Hall of Fame and Museum building was opened and the first 10 members were formally inducted.

Many other great baseball players were Masons. A few of the well known names include: Mickey Cochrane, Bob Feiler, Jimmy Foxx, Frankie Frisch, Rogers Hornsby, Carl Hubbell, Christy Mathewson, Willie Mays, and Pie Traynor.

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DID YOU KNOW?

Independence Hall in Philadelphia has many Masonic connections. It stands on land purchased by William Allen, Grand Master of PA. The ground was staked by Edmond Wolley, a Mason. Thomas Boude, the brick mason, was the first Secretary of St. John's Lodge of Philadelphia and later Deputy Grand Master. Benjamin Franklin laid the cornerstone while Grand Master (1734) with the assistance of St. John's Lodge. Brother Andrew McNair of Philadelphia rang the bell to call the populace on July 8, 1776, to hear the reading of the Declaration of Independence. The Liberty Bell cracked in 1835 when it tolled the death of Chief Justice John Marshall, Past Grand Master of Virginia.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

September 12, 1826

William Morgan was abducted by Freemasons who took him to Fort Niagara. According to some claims, Morgan was murdered. Other accounts state that Morgan was given \$500 to start a new life elsewhere. Whatever the truth, Morgan was never seen again, although his abduction would be a catalyst in the formation of the anti-masonic party.

September 8, 1925

Born at Southsea, Hampshire, England, was Bro. Peter Sellers, an award-winning British comedian and film star, best remembered for his role as the bumbling character, Inspector Clouseau in the "Pink Panther" films, "Dr. Strangelove," and in the BBC radio "Goon Show." He was initiated in Chelsea Lodge 3098 in London. . He died at London, England, July 24, 1980.

Albert Pike's Masonic Library Saved by Enemy Brother

A Union General, Thomas H. Benton, Grand Master in Iowa (1860-62) saved Albert Pike's Masonic Library at Little Rock, Arkansas, by placing Federal Troops around Pike's home when the city was invaded during the Civil War.

Why We Meet

Senior Deacon

Barely clears a Ford Focus Loses a tug of war with a locomotive Can fire a speeding bullet Swims well Is occasionally addressed by God

Junior Deacon

Makes high marks on the wall when trying to leap tall buildings Is run over by a locomotive
