THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

November 8, 1731

Bro. Benjamin Franklin laid the cornerstone for the foundations for a library which developed into the Philadelphia Public Library, the first public library in America. He was raised at St. John's Lodge of Philadelphia to begin an auspicious Masonic career.

November 11, 1966

Gemini 12 blasted off from Cape Kennedy., Fl. with astronauts James A. Lovell and Bro. Irwin (Buzz) Aldrin, Jr. On this the final flight for Gemini, Bro. Aldrin spacewalked for 5 1/2 hours on November 15, after an Agena link-up. Bro. Aldrin was initiated in Montclair Lodge 144, Montclair, New Jersey.

EXPENSE ACCOUNT

In the Archives of Vincennes Lodge No. 1, Indiana is a "Bill of expenses in going to Corydon, attending the Convention and returning home", which was submitted by General Washington Johnston in December 1817. It includes such necessities as the cost of shoeing his horse, a supply of whisky, the fee for crossing White River on a ferry, and "rum and sugar for journey."

THE ORIGIN OF THE TERM FELLOW CRAFT

The term "Fellow" has a long and distinguished history, most commonly used to denote that one is of higher status than just being a member of some organization. One becomes a fellow of a research or educational society, for example, by being voted into that position after having done research and being published. Members of teaching staff of a university who are not full members of the faculty are sometimes called "teaching fellows." In the guide from which we believe Masonry arose, a "Fellow of the Craft" had roughly the same status as a journeyman would have today. When Masonry had only one Degree there was a section, known as the "Fellow's Part" which was conferred on those who had shown a mastery of the material of the Apprentice Degree.

DISASTER APPEAL FOR LOUISIANA

The Masonic Service Association has established a Disaster Relief Fund for Louisiana, following drenching rainstorms and massive flooding. Thousands of homes and buildings have been damaged or destroyed, with 70,000 persons reportedly displaced.

The magnitude of the storm was described by the America Red Cross as the "worst natural disaster in the United States" since Hurricane Sandy in 2012. Recovery is expected to take months, and the lack of communication in flooded areas continues to cause issues in finding information and victims.

The Grand Lodge of Louisiana reported that two Lodge buildings have been heavily flooded, and the building of the Scottish Rite Valley of Baton Rouge, which houses three additional Lodges, incurred significant amounts of flooding and damage. Many Masons and Masonic families are among the 70,000 displaced.
