Why President McKinley Became a Mason

When General Horatio King asked William McKinley how he happen to become a Mason he explained: "After the Battle of Opequam, I went with the surgeon of our Ohio regiment to the field where there were about 5,000 Confederate prisoners under guard. "Did you know these men or ever see them before?"

"No," replied the doctor, "I never saw them before."

"But," I persisted, "You gave them a lot of money, all you had about you. Do you ever expect to get it back?"

"Well" said the doctor, "If they are able to pay me back, they will. But it makes no difference to me; they are brother Masons in trouble and I am only doing my duty."

"I said to myself, If that is Freemasonry I will take some of it for myself."

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

December 12, 1851

In Statesburg, S.C., Bro. Joel Roberts Poinsett, the Mason who introduced the South American plant named for him into the U.S., died. Dr. Poinsett, a career diplomat (first US Ambassador to Mexico), member of Congress and Secretary of War, was born in Charleston, S.C. March 2, 1799. Bro. Poinsett, an amateur botanist, developed the Poinsettia which has since become a favorite Christmas season plant.

December 14, 1799

Brother, General George Washington passed away at his home in Mount Vernon, VA. Two days earlier he had made a tour on horseback of his farm in cold, snowy weather wherein he caught a severe cold. On his return his wife Martha found him to suffering a chill and high temperature. She sent for his doctor who arrived accompanied by two others. Bro. Washington in high fever could hardly speak, his throat being blocked. The doctors - all but one - administered the traditional cure at the time - leeches to "bleed" the general free of his throat congestion; They continued to remove considerable blood in hopes of relieving his distress and reducing the fever. The congestion remained. One doctor - the youngest - recommended a tracheotomy but was overruled. Bro. Washington, historians, agree might have been saved by a tracheotomy, instead of literally being bled to death; and so he (prematurely) died. Bro. Washington, most honored American, father of his country, and Freemason who was 20 years, eight months and 12 days old, when he was initiated on November 4. 1752 in Fredericksburg Lodge.

Why are discussions of politics and religion forbidden in lodge?

The prohibition goes back to the early history of the Fraternity. It is written in the second paragraph of the sixth "Old Charge" (Behavior after the Lodge is over and the Brethren are gone); "No private Piques or Quarrels must be brought within the Door of the Lodge, far less any Quarrels about Religion, or Nations, or State policy, we being only, as Masons, of the Catholick Religion above mentioned; we are also of all Nations, Tongues, Kindreds, and Languages, and are resolved against all Politicks as what never get conduc'd to the Welfare of the Lodge, nor ever will. This Charge has been always strictly enjoin'd and observ'd, but especially since the Reformation in Britain, or the Dissent and Secession of these Nations from the Communion of Rome."

Freemasons today hold that the Old Charge prohibits lodge discussion of politics in the sense of partisan politics and religion in the sense of sectarian religion.
