CIGARS

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

September 13, 1814

On the night of September 13th Bro. Francis Scott Key was aboard a ship that was delayed in Baltimore Harbor by the British attack on Fort Henry. Bro. Key had no choice but to anxiously watch the battle. That experience and seeing the American flag still flying over the Fort the next morning inspired him to pen the verses that coupled with the tune of a popular drinking song became our official National Anthem in 1931 - 117 years after the words were written.

September 14, 1901

Bro. William McKinley, then President of the United States, was shot at Buffalo, NY. He died eight days later. His assassin Leon Czolgosz was executed on October 29, 1901. The 25th President of the U.S. was initiated in Hiram Lodge 21 at Winchester, VI on May 1, passed on May 2, and raised on May 5, 1865. He was affiliated with Canton Lodge 60 at Canton, OH, and was a member of Mark and Royal Arch, and a Knight Templar.

WHY IS ACACIA A MASONIC SYMBOL?

In putting acacia at the Master's temporary grave, Freemasonry follows beliefs which go back to the captivity of the Jews in Egypt. Here acacia was supposed to have grown about and protected the chest into which Osiris had been tricked by his jealous brother, Typhon. Searching for her husband, Osiris, Isis discovered the tree in the home of a Phoenician king; for service she rendered the king, he gave her the tree and thus the body of her husband.

Like the evergreens of this country, acacia is hardy. Sprouts come often from beams and columns made of acacia, the shittah wood of the Old Testament. The Jews planted it on graves as a symbol of life, and to mark the resting place of the dead that footsteps profane it not.

As myrtle was to the Greeks, mistletoe to the Scandinavians and lotus to the Egyptians, symbols of immortality, so is acacia to Freemasonry.

DID YOU KNOW?

FREEMASONS AT GETTYSBURG CAPTAIN JAMES HEAD – Age 25 at Gettysburg

Born: March 12, 1838, Newtown, Pennsylvania Died: June 10, 1887, Glanville, PA, age 49

James Head was promoted to captain of the U.S. Army in 1863. He was wounded at Gettysburg and he fought in the 25^{th} Pennsylvania Infantry. He served with the 1^{st} Brigade, 2^{nd} Division, 3^{rd} Corp. They lost 59.4%, killed, wounded and missing during the fighting of the second day at Gettysburg. He served in the army throughout the nation's bloodiest war only to be killed by lightning, at age 49, in the yard outside his home.

Mason: Captain James Head was a member of the Philadelphia Lodge, in Philadelphia where he was also a member of Knights Templar.

MISSOURI'S FIRST

Grocery stores were questionable places in 1852, if we may believe this section of the by-laws of Sedalia, Missouri's first lodge:

Visiting a grocery store for the purpose of playing at cards, or any other game of chance, shall be found guilty of un-Masonic conduct.

And the lodge did a banking business among its members:

On motion, resolved that the W.M. in the absence of the treasurer be authorized to loan any money on hand belonging to the lodge and not needed for the expenses of the lodge upon such terms as shall be conducive to the interest of the lodge.

In later records we find that a rate of 6 per cent was conducive to the interest of the lodge.
