THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

March 4, 1789

The first Congress of the US met in New York City wherein electoral votes were counted and Bro. George Washington was declared first President (69 votes), and John Adams, Vice President (34 votes). While Bro. Washington's term of office began on this day, because there was no quorum, he could not take the oath of office until April 30. All subsequent presidential terms (except successions following the death of a President) began March 4 until after Bro. Franklin Delano Roosevelt's second term wherein the 20th Amendment to the Constitution ruled that "the terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th of January.and the terms of their successors shall then begin..."

March 23, 1775

At St. John's Church in Richmond, Bro. Patrick Henry, American patriot, urged for the arming of the Virginia militia in preparation for the American revolution with the impassioned words: "I know not what course others may take, but as for or me, give me liberty or give me death."

MAKING A MASON AT SIGHT

Making a Mason at sight is considered one of the traditional powers of a Grand Master. It means that he convenes an occasional Lodge, waives the usual requirements relative to becoming a member of the Craft such as filing a petition, having an investigation of the petitioner, passing the ballot box, etc., and the three degrees are conferred in full on the candidate at one meeting. There is an implied understanding that after the ceremony the new member will file a petition or affiliate with a lodge of his choice. This power is rarely exercised by a Grand Master. Some of the persons who have become Masons in this manner are: Douglas MacArthur, George Marshall, William Howard Taft and John Wanamaker.

DID YOU KNOW?

Rudyard Kipling and the Craft

Rudyard Kipling, the famous English author, was born in India of English parents. He was educated in England but returned to India in 1880.

He was initiated in Hope and Perseverance Lodge No. 782, Lahore, Punjab, India in 1886. A special dispensation was necessary as he was only twenty years and six months at the time

When he took the degrees, there were four Holy Books upon the alter representing the dominant religions in the area. Upon his rising he was immediately elected secretary; and he prepared the minutes of that meeting himself.

Many years later he wrote: "I was secretary for some years of Hope and Perseverance Lodge No. 782, E. C., Lahore, which included Brethren of at least four creeds.

I was entered by a member of Brahmo Somaj, a Hindu; passed by a Mohammedan; and raised by an Englishman. Our Tyler was an Indian Jew. We met, of course on the level, and the only difference anyone would notice was that at the banquets, some of the Brethren, who were debarred by caste from eating food not ceremonially prepared, sat over empty plates."
