#### THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

#### October 13, 1793

Freemasons laid the cornerstone of The White House. Hugh Sidey writing in the October 2000 issue of TIME magazine claims that mystery still lingers over where the Freemasons laid the cornerstone back in 1792. "There is no doubt," writes Sidey, "that on the afternoon of October 13, 1792, a group of Freemasons marched from Georgetown to the site of what is now The White House and laid a cornerstone. That evening, though, by about the 11th toast - this one to "the fair daughters of Americas" the congenial gathering of Freemasons at Georgetown's Fountain Inn had begun to grow a bit hazy about where they had laid that particular stone earlier in the day." Among the most important and exalted buildings to Americans is the White House, home and office to residents, symbol of liberty to the world, is getting all polished up for the 200th commemoration of the day (Nov 1) President John Adams moved into the brand new edifice. But even now we're not sure where those jovial Masons put the cornerstone." The cornerstone, fitted with a brass plate naming those participants in the cornerstone laying, is supposed to be on the northeast corner, according to Masonic tradition. But dowsers, short-wave probes, and Anonymous letters seem to indicate the problem cornerstone is on the southwest corner.

#### MASONIC GLOSSARY - SHIBBOLETH

The word which the Gileadites under Jephthah made use of as a test at the passages of the river Jordan after a victory over the Ephraimites. The word has two meanings in Hebrew: First, an ear of corn; and, secondly, a stream of water. As the Ephraimites were desirous of crossing the river, it is probable that this second meaning suggested it to the Gileadites as an appropriate test word on the occasion.

#### WHY IS RITUAL OFTEN REPETITIOUS?

Several "word pairs" in Masonic ritual make interesting studies, such as "duly and truly," "worthy and well-qualified," free will and accord," "parts and points," "hele and conceal."

At first glance, it may seem that these are so arranged only for emphasis. In Middle Age English writing, especially in the 13th and 14th Centuries, when Freemasonry was in the process of formation, England had two languages. One was Norman-French; the other Anglo-Saxon. To make sure of understanding, word pairs were much in use -- a word of similar meaning being taken from each language.

The apparent redundancy or expression in a number of places in Masonic ritual may be traced back to these Middle Ages. The perpetuation of such usage now, when clarity of thought and understanding might be served as well with one word, is one of the many proofs that Freemasonry delights to embrace that which is venerated and ancient."
