THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

September 22, 1776

Nathan Hale, the American patriot, was hanged by the British as a spy during the Revolution. He was not a Freemason, though was mistaken for one by many Masonic writers to be a Colonel of the same name, Col. Nathan Hale, who had been a member of St. John's Lodge in Portsmouth, He too was captured by the British at Hubbardton during the American Revolution but died a war prisoner in 1780. New Hampshire. This should have been evident for the Nathan Hale who was executed as a spy had been born in 1756 and executed in 1776. That would have made him 20 years old at the time of his execution. While not an impossible age for a Freemason it would have been rare one.

September 19, 1778

Bro. Henry Peter Brougham, born in Edinburgh, Scotland, from 1830, Lord High Chancellor of England. In 1802 he cofounded the "Edinburgh Review," practiced at the English bar in 1808 and served as a member of parliament in 1810. He carried the measure making slave trade a felony and in 1828 was a founder of London University. The Brougham carriage was named for him. Bro. Brougham was initiated, passed and raised in Fortrose Lodge., Stonoway, Scotland, in 1799, and on June 24, 1800, affiliated with Cononate Kilwinning Lodge in Edinburgh. He died May 7, 1868, at Cannes, France.

WISDOM

Prudence in Masonry means wisdom; wisdom was anciently a cardinal virtue and the mere changing of the syllables by which it is denominated does not change its nature. It is the wisdom which was meant by the writer of Proverbs, who said, "the heart of the prudent getteth knowledge."

Freemasonry is a system of wisdom of heart, wisdom of mind, wisdom, if the Mason so wills it, of soul. It is an approach of man to his Creator. It is a looking forward to better days and a looking up to higher things. Its whole structure is aimed at helping a man in the formation of good character. Wisdom is an essential for this, from thinking, rather than from education and teaching. Consider prudence as meaning a wisdom of both heart and mind and it becomes something high and holy and much more impressive than mere precaution, judged by the modern and colloquial meaning of the word prudence . . . therefore, a man is prudent when he allows wisdom to rule his actions.

THE MASONIC OAK OF TEXAS

In 1835 a group of Masons met under a large oak tree in Brazoria, Texas, and took the first step to form Holland Lodge No. 1. The tree, known as the Masonic Oak, has continued to grow and is still in existence.

On May 15, 1966, the Masons of Texas made a pilgrimage to the Oak. There was singing, dinner, preaching and much fun. The Grand Master, H. W. Fullingim, dedicated the place by placing a Texas State Historical Marker near the Oak to commemorate the start of the lodge there.

ELIAS ASHMOLE

The name Elias Ashmole is constantly mentioned when discussing Freemasonry and its history. The reason for his significance is his admission into a lodge in 1646 as a speculative Mason, a practice that is theorized to have occurred long before that time. It was said that admissions of non-Masons to the fraternity exacerbated a panic that caused operative lodges to destroy records for fear of their information falling into the wrong hands.

Ashmole was a politician, collector, and antiquarian with a thirst for knowledge, especially when it came to alchemy and astrology. He was in fact, an avid student in the study of alchemy, and in the 1650's, he was able to compile and publish many manuscripts that were formerly only part of private collections. In later years, Ashmole even consulted on astrological matters with King Charles II and his court.
