SUSPENSION OF MASONIC ACTIVITIES EXTENDED BY GRAND MASTER

On April 2, 2020, R.W. Grand Master Thomas Gamon IV extended the suspension of all Masonic activities until June 1, 2020. A copy of the letter can be found on the District website. Depending on the status of the pandemic, it may be extended again once June is upon us.

As an interesting aside, Bristol Lodge No. 25 is a Moon Lodge which meets the Saturday on or before a full moon. Presuming they call off from labor in the summer months, they will not reconvene until at least September.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

May 14, 1796

Bro. Edward Jenner, a physician in rural England, successfully found a cure for smallpox. Bro. Jenner had spent two decades studying reports of dairy farmers who seemed to become immune to smallpox because of exposure to cowpox, a related but milder disease. Bro. Jenner injected cowpox in a healthy 8-year-old boy who subsequently developed cowpox. Six weeks later, Bro. Jenner injected the boy with Smallpox. He remained healthy. Bro. Jenner called this new procedure vaccination, from vaccine, another term for cowpox. Within 18 months, 12,000 people in England had been vaccinated and the number of smallpox deaths dropped by two-thirds. Jenner's development of a vaccine eventually led to the complete eradication of smallpox worldwide. Bro. Jenner was a member of Royal Faith and Friendship Lodge No. 2780, Berkeley, England, in which he served a term as Master (1811-13). He died in 1822.

THE SYMOBLISM OF THE PINECONE

During a recent video presentation on Masonic Esoterica hosted by the Castle Valley Lodge No. 190, Manitoba, Canada, the presenter, Bro. Jaime Paul Lamb, referenced the pinecone as a symbol once used in Freemasonry.

In Freemasonry, we must consider the pinecone's popularity as a motif in religious and secular architecture. The pinecones in Freemason architecture and symbolism has the spiritual significance of the Third Eye which is a mystical and esoteric concept of a speculative invisible eye, usually depicted as located on the forehead. This provides perception beyond ordinary sight or a state of enlightenment. Pinecones regularly appear framed in Freemason Octagons on the ceilings of Masonic Lodges. Pinecones also turn up as sources of "illumination" in the church, such as candleholders and lamps, seemingly symbolic of the spiritual illumination.

Our "Pine" al Gland, shaped like the pinecone, is at the geometric center of our brain and is intimately linked to our body's perception of light. In addition to spiritual consciousness and enlightenment, pinecones have also historically been used as symbols of everlasting or eternal life. In the Third Degree, coniferous trees, such as the Cedar of Lebanon brought from Tyre and used in building King Solomon's Temple. It has long been utilized as a symbol of the immortality of the human soul.

FREEMASONRY AND THE SPANISH FLU

Since the appearance of the Coronacvirus-COVID-19, there have been comparisons made to the Spanish Flu pandemic (Jan. 1918-Dec. 1920). As we find ourselves with Masonic activities being cancelled, I was curious about references to Masonic actions taken during that epidemic.

"It should be noted that the influenza outbreak of 1918 devastated the world, killing an estimated 50 million people in contrast to the 16 million who died during World War I (July 1914-November 1918). One-fourth of the American population suffered from the influenza outbreak to some extent. The influenza epidemic struck the Elizabethtown area as severely as other locations. In a grand gesture of service to the community, doctors transferred the Masonic Homes residents without influenza from the Philadelphia Freemason Hospital to the Grand Lodge Hall Infirmary and opened the on-site hospital to community members with influenza. "This became a splendid asylum for the sorely stricken families of the vicinity who had no place else to go," the Committee on Masonic Homes reported. During the several months the hospital took patients from the community, 82 people with no Masonic affiliation received the best treatment possible. As a result of quarantines and precautions, no Masonic Homes residents or guests died from the influenza epidemic." (A Brief History of Masonic Charity, Grand Lodge of PA website)

In many states the local Masonic Temples/Halls were transformed into hospital facilities where there were none or to handle an overflow of patients. "It was not uncommon for several members of a household…to be under treatment simultaneously at the Masonic Temple hospital."

Among a collection of personal narratives, manuscripts and ephemera about the influenza pandemic, housed at UCLA, is a letter from Pvt. E. R. Mather serving in France, during the war, to his mother in Illinois where he describes in some detail "an evening party of Masons from the regiment, and a military funeral with Masonic rites for a regimental officer, a Mason, who had died from the Spanish influenza."

The 200th Anniversary History of Bristol Lodge No. 25, F. & A.M. states, "Owing to the quarantine regulations during the flu epidemic, no Stated Meeting was held in October 1918. Nearly 500,000 people in the United States died from influenza after it struck sometime in September. The Philadelphia area was especially hard hit by the attack."
