MASONIC ETIQUETE

Masonic Etiquette is simply having respect for the Fraternity, your lodge, the members, its officers and yourself. Since it is rarely ever discussed, some clarity needs to be provided as it is evident that some brothers are not familiar with Masonic Etiquette and/or Masonic Law. In future newsletters other examples of etiquette will be presented; but below are some of the more frequent errors:

When a brother is dressed in a tuxedo, the tuxedo shirts are to be a plain or pleated front white shirt (no ruffles) and plain collar (no wing collars). Gloves are to be plain white with no embroidery or insignias. Black socks are required to be worn with the tuxedo.

Unless it is specifically announced on a registration announcement, all Grand Lodge functions and sponsored functions require Masonic Dress, especially when held at the Masonic Temple. Masonic Dress is a sport coat and slacks or suit, a dress shirt, tie and shoes,

Some training events and District Schools of Instructions may ease the requirement of Masonic Dress to "business casual"; which consists of a collared shirt, slacks or khaki pants and shoes; a sport jacket being optional. At no time are t-shirts, flannel shirts, jeans, shorts, sneakers or sandals appropriate at a Masonic function, except possibly a picnic. If a brother has a medical issue requiring some clothing alternative, it should be brought to the attention of the Worshipful Master and the item substituted should be as close to the requirements as possible; i.e., a black sneaker vs white or colored sneakers.

When a prayer is offered, the brothers are to rise and assume the attitude of prayer position. This is done with your arms brought forward and your hands folded right over left.

When speaking to the Worshipful Master, you will rise, throw the appropriate sign, be recognized and state your message. Upon the conclusion of speaking, you will take your seat without throwing any sign again.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

April 10. 1794

Born in Kingston, R.I. was Bro. Matthew Calbraith Perry, Commodore of the US Navy, negotiator of the first treaty between the US and Japan (March 31, 1854), its first contact with western powers. The treaty gave the US trading rights at two Japanese ports. In 1837, he commanded the first naval steamships, earning him the title of "Father of the Steam Navy." Bro., Perry became a member of Holland Lodge No. 8 in New York City in 1819. He died March 4, 1858.

GLOSSARY – SETTING MAUL

A wooden hammer used by Operative Masons to "set" the stones in their proper positions. It is in Speculative Masonry a symbol, in the third degree, reminding us of the death of the builder of the Temple, which is said to have been effected by this instrument. In some Lodges it is very improperly used by the Master as his gavel from which it totally differs in form and in symbolic signification. The gavel is a symbol of order and decorum, the setting-maul of death by violence.

LODGE SPRING CLEANING CHECKLIST

The days are steadily growing longer, much of the ground has thawed and the familiar sounds of spring have begun to fill the air. Looking ahead towards the warm embrace of the summer, spring is the perfect time to pause and consider how we can all freshen up our Lodges in the spirit of spring cleaning season.

Below is a quick spring cleaning checklist to help guide you and your Brothers as you begin sprucing up your Lodge.

- Clean up the entrance to your Lodge, including front hall or front windows.
- Remove unused items that are cluttering up the foyer and common area to make it more inviting
- Consider adding some new plants, flowers, or Masonic decor to the front of the Lodge to make it more inviting
- Inventory, clean and/or replace candidate outfits
- Make sure preparation rooms will inspire new candidates and get them ready for their upcoming degree
- Take inventory on any printed materials or resources you may have at the Lodge and ensure they are up to date
- Spruce up the bathrooms by ensuring floors, stalls and sinks are cleaned and restocked with fresh rolls of toilet paper, paper towels and hand soap
- Clean up the Lodge room by vacuuming any carpeting, wipe down and dust chairs, tables, pictures, plaques, lamps and any other furniture in the space
