THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

September 11, 1777

The largest engagement of the American Revolutionary War took place between the Continental Army led by Bro. George Washington and British troops led by General William Howe. Howe was marching to take Philadelphia when Bro. Washington chose to try and stop Howe's advance at the Brandywine River near Chadds Ford, PA. The American forces were defeated and the British went on to take Philadelphia on September 26th. The British spent the winter in Philadelphia while Bro. Washington's troops suffered the winter through at their encampment at Valley Forge, PA.

WHAT MAKES A SUCCESSFUL LODGE? HERE IS ONE LIST OF ATTRIBUTES

Over the years, many writers have addressed the subject of making a Lodge successful. Here is a list from a recent article by the Rev. K. F. Maxwell-Whale, published in the British, *The Square, The Independent Magazine for Freemasons*.

- 1. A careful selection process for new members
- 2. A fully committed membership who are keen to learn and promote Masonry
- 3. Fully committed Officers of the Lodge
- 4. A Master who can control the Lodge, together with the Lodge Committee, and also protecting tradition together with the Lodge Director of Ceremonies
- 5. A strong but fair Director of Ceremonies with the necessary knowledge to oversee the training of members and officers of the lodge
- 6. A strong Lodge Officer Instructor. Acknowledging the failings of others and having a willingness to help each other
- 7. Humor and friendship between member
- 8. Compassion for all, from all
- 9. A sincere acknowledgement of visitors

<u>NOTE</u>: Definitions of terms used in the UGLE in the above article not common in Pennsylvania Freemasonry:

Lodge Committee: is a specially hand-chosen Task Force to relieve the Worshipful Master of the day-to-day tasks which he must oversee. These tasks are delegated to specific groups, which perform these necessary functions and report their results back to the Worshipful Master and the lodge members. https://www.masonic-lodge-of-education.com

Lodge Director of Ceremonies: The role of the Lodge DC is an important office within any lodge and he should ideally be a Past Master of the Lodge, be well versed in the ritual, Lodge by–laws and should see his prime role as one of ensuring continued compliance with the Lodge's ritual, as well as ensuring compliance with established Grand Lodge and Provincial Grand Lodge practice. He should ensure the meeting, Lodge of instruction, ceremonies and festive boards are carried out with dignity, decorum, and expedition. His knowledge of protocol, both within the Lodge and at the festive board, is of great importance.

Making a Mason at Sight

Making a Mason at Sight is considered one of the traditional powers of Grand Master. It means that he convenes an occasional Lodge, waives the usual requirements relative to becoming a member of the Craft such as filing a petition, having an investigation of the petitioner, passing the ballot box, etc., and the three degrees are conferred in full on the candidate at one meeting. There is an implied understanding that after the ceremony the new members will file a petition to affiliate with a lodge of his choice. This power is rarely exercised by a Grand Master.

Some of the persons who have become Masons in this manner are: Douglas MacArthur, George Marshall, William Howard Taft and John Wannamaker.

CONSIDERING SUCCESS OR FAILURE

(*Editor's Note:* In light of the recent passing of Brother Thomas W. Jackson, R.W. Past Grand Secretary, I present the following from his book.)

For a good many years, I have given thought to the significance of Freemasonry, as well as the purpose of the Craft. Certainly, there are many definitions existing that state it's [sic] purpose, all of them admirable, some ethereal.

There is no doubt that in many cases, and provably most, we succeed. In others, we fail. The successes and failures depend upon our efforts and systems, as well as our member's willingness to receive and respond to our efforts.

The success or failure of a man in life, however, depends more upon the recipient than upon the giver, and I would suspect that our failures are less of our making than of the brother's willingness to accept our philosophies and principles.

I was reading the publication of the Grand Lodge of Hawaii recently and I saw a little quotation which impressed me. It was an old Indian saying:

When you were born, You cried and the world rejoiced.

Live your life in such a manner that when you die the world cries and you rejoice.

So great would be the Craft if we simply accomplished instilling that adage into our members. I have expressed a number of times that the value of the life of a man might be determined by the number who are sad when he passes away. That basically, is what is expressed in the old Indian saying.

Our definition is to take good men and make them better. How much better could we do than to have the world cry when we die?
