THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

October 17, 1777

British Gen. Borgoyne surrendered his Army to Gen. Gates at Saratoga. And thus triggered a conspiracy to oust Bro. and General George Washington as head of the American armies. Borgoyne's surrender to Gates held many embarrassments for Bro. Washington. Gates refused Borgoyne's sword and allowed all the surrendered British soldiers to march out of the camp (without arms) and be given free passage home to England. When Borgoyne presented himself to Gates to surrender he said: "The fortunes of war, General Gates, has made me your prisoner.." To which Gates replied: I shall always be ready to bear testimony that it has not been through any fault of Your Excellency. Commander in Chief Bro. Washington, who had recently suffered a series of defeats, said the victory "surpassed our most sanguine expectations." And fellow officers began to speculate that Gates might replace Bro. Washington as Commander in Chief. It was General Thomas Conway who suggested Washington seemed an incompetent who should be replaced by General Gates. Several highranking congressional officials and military officers were among supporters of the Conway plan. The plot was abandoned after Bro. Washington boldly confronted the conspirators and one of the general's aides wounded Conway gravely in a duel.

'DUE' DOES MAKE A DIFERENCE TO A MASON

The word, 'due', shows up in a number of Masonic expressions, such as "due form" and "due guard."

Both express responsibilities of the officers and members of a Lodge and are admonishments as to their conduct.

According to Mackey's *Encyclopedia*, "due form" comes from the French expression, "en du forme," with the "du" coming from "devoir" or "to owe." In subordinate Lodges, the officers and members "owe" it to their brothers to perform their actions properly and with attention to the established usages and customs.

The "due guard" is a mode of recognition referring to the act of duly guarding a member's obligations and in reminding him of a penalty should he violate such obligations. Mackey reports that this expression is not found in English or continental Masonry, and is fairly recent within the Americas.

In a similar manner, "due examination" is a test procedure to correct form, as prescribed by Masonic laws.

In addition, "due" is associated with direction and indicates what is "proper." When found on a map, "due east" is precisely east, with no variation north or south.

Thus, the expectation imparted with the word "due," is a strict adherence and effort toward Truth and Light.

BUFFALO SOLDIERS & PRINCE HALL FREEMASONS

In the book, 'Black Square & Compass: 200 Years of Prince Hall Freemasonry under the title of "Those Magnificent Masonic Buffalo Soldiers." (1979), by Joseph Walkes, the author of this article, he wrote, "After the Civil War, there would ride into the Indian Territory of the West, the greatest military cavalry unit America ever assembled. They were The Buffalo Soldiers, so named by the Indians they fought because the Troopers' hair reminded them of buffalo fur. Magnificent Black men, who would ride across the frontiers of the early west and into the pages of the history of an often ungrateful nation.

Today the nation would remember these forgotten brave Troopers by the issuance of the postage stamp in their honour, the winners of eighteen Congressional Medals of Honour. These men of the 9th and 10th Cavalry Regiment were sustained by the number of Prince Hall Masonic Lodges attached to them. The first was Baldwin Lodge No. 16 attached to the 10th Cavalry in 1883 and probably named for their Commanding Officer, Capt. T.S. Baldwin born in New Jersey, who became a Brigadier-General. It was under his command that the 10th Cavalry led by Black noncommissioned officers, saved Col. Teddy Roosevelt and his Rough Riders from being massacred at the famous charge up San Juan Hill."

Baldwin Lodge was chartered by the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Texas. All of the other military lodges were chartered by the Prince Hall Grand Lode of Missouri. Eureka Military Lodge No. 135, established in 1888 and attached to the 10th Cavalry; Adventure Military Lodge No. 136 attached to the 9th Cavalry; Gillespie No.140; Military Lodge No. 152 thought to be attached to the 9th Cavalry; Military Lodge No. 153 also the 9th Cavalry; Joppa Military Lodge No.150, 9th Cavalry of which photographs have been found of the members in Masonic regalia and uniform.

The members of these units and lodges had to put up with unbelievable racism and yet they kept the faith to their country and to their Masonic obligations. When Joseph Walkes joined the Army in 1951, he was honoured to meet some of the old 10th Cavalry Troopers who were still on active duty and preparing to retire. When he retired from the Army in 1973, there were a number of the 10th Cavalry Troopers living in Leavenworth, Kansas,, most of them quire old. But today to witness their country saluting them and telling them that they served their country above and beyond the call of duty brings tears to us all.
