THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

June 14, 1966

Each year the United States celebrates National Flag wherein the American people are called upon to participate in public ceremonies in which the Pledge of Allegiance is recited. The day was first proclaimed in 1966 by President and Bro. Lyndon B. Johnson.

June 8, 1915

Bro. William Jennings Bryan resigned as Secretary of State to protest the US handling of the sinking of the Lusitania by Germany. Bro. Bryan was an extreme pacifist. Bro. Bryan was raised on Lincoln Lodge No. 19. Lincoln, NE on April 15, 1902, and later affiliated with Temple Lodge No. 247, Miami, FL. He died in court at Dayton, TN on July 26, 1925, and is buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

DID YOU KNOW?

Pharmacist Freemasons and Soft Drinks

Whether you call it a soft drink, fizzy drink or soda pop, these popular beverages are everywhere. Many were invented by pharmacist Freemasons.

Pharmacist Charles C. Alerton, P.M. Waco (TX) Lodge No. 92, invented Dr. Pepper as an alternative to sarsaparilla, lemon and vanilla flavors. First sold in 1885, it was introduced to the world at the 1904 World's Fair in St. Louis.

Pharmacist John S. Pemberton, Columbian Lodge No. 7, Columbus, GA, invented Penertonn's French wine cola nerve tonic in 1885. Due to local prohibition, Bro. Pemberton soon modified the recipe to create the non-alcoholic Coca Cola.

Pharmacist Caleb D. Bradham, P.M., St. John's Lodge No. 3, New Bern, NC, invented Pepsi Cola in 1893. Bro. Bradham believed it aided digestion like the pepsin enzyme, hence the name.

Pharmacist John J. McLaughlin, Cedar Lodge No. 270, Oshawa Ontario, Canada, invented Canada Dry Pale Ginger Ale in 1904 as a less sweet alternative to other ginger ales of the time.
