THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

June 6, 1755

American patriot, Bro. Nathan Hale was born at Coventry, CT. During the battles for New York in the American Revolution he volunteered to seek military intelligence behind enemy lines and was captured on the night of September 21, 1776. Before British General William Howe, Bro. Hale admitted to being an American officer and was ordered hanged the following morning. His dying words reportedly were: "I only regret I have but one life to lose for my country." He was hanged September 22, 1776, at what is now the intersection of Market Street and East Broadway, New York City. The Martyred Bro. Nathan Hale was thought to be a member of St. John's Regimental Lodge of New York City. No real proof exists.

DID YOU KNOW? MASONIC CHARITY HELPED FATHER OF JOSEPH FORT NEWTON

In his lifetime Joseph Fort Newton was the silver-tonged orator of the Craft. With his talks and book, *The Builders, A Story and Study of Masonry* (1914), he did much for Freemasonry.

He told the story that his father became a mason in a military lodge. He had been taken prisoner and was transported to Rock Island, Illinois, where he became desperately ill. An officer of the camp, desiring to help him as a Brother Mason, took him to his home and nursed him back to health.

When the war ended the Mason loaned him enough money to get back home.

If Newton's father had died on Rock Island, the world would have been poorer for not having had a wise and eloquent minister of the gospel, and the Craft would have been poorer in its inspiration and literature.

THE WORK

The gavel sounds and all is still: The Master speaks, proclaims his will: Each one obeys, takes up his tools. Inspects the plan, consults the rules:

With trowel and level, plumb and square, Each stone is set exactly where The plan provides, the drawing shows And day by day, the Temple grows:

The porch is finished, pillars placed The strands of net-work, interlaced The chambers furnished, pavement laid, The sacred vessels all displayed:

The walls are standing, straight and true The roof is on, the labor through: The Master speaks, The work is done: The gavel sounds, God calls us home.

'MOST POWERFUL MAN IN BASEBALL' WAS MASON

Byron Bancroft "Ban" Johnson. Around the start of the 20th Century, was known as "the most powerful man in baseball" – not because of his home run ability, but for his influence as the national game developed.

Brother Johnson was born in Norwalk, Ohio in 1864, and was a member of Nova Caesarea Harmony Lodge, No. 2, in Cincinnati, Ohio.

He went to college to become a minister, and then began to study law before becoming a newspaper sports writer. In that role, he met Charles Comiskey and formed the Western Baseball League, with Johnson as president.

In 1900, the league was renamed the America League, and Johnson enticed leading National League players to join the new league. Brother Johnson is credited with cleaning up the sport by doing away with gambling, rioting, brawling, and crookedness.

He helped establish the World Series between the American and National League Champions.

After his retirement, Brother Johnson helped to organize the Little League, which for many years was called the Ban Johnson Little League.

NORTHEAST CORNER

As one progresses through the rites and symbolisms of Freemasonry, receiving more and more Light, he reaches the Northeast Corner with all the outward appearances of a perfect and upright Mason, a true and tried representative of the cornerstone of a great moral and spiritual edifice.

Masonic legend and ritual recognize the northeast corner as the proper place for laying the corner-stone in an edifice; symbolically this corner represents the beginning of the laying of the corner-stone of the spiritual superstructure which every true Mason must build. Here, in the Northeast Corner, ceremonies and instructions, the initiate commences the moral and intellectual task of erecting a spiritual temple in his heart. The corner-stone is emblematic of a "well-tried, true, and trusty" Masonic character which he begins now to build -- the squareness of its surface, emblematic of morality; its cubical form, emblematic of firmness and stability of character; the peculiar finish and fineness of the material, emblematic of virtue and holiness. In consecrated language of symbolism the newly admitted Apprentice is instructed in a life of integrity and stability of conduct, of truthfulness and uprightness of character, and of purity and holiness in all human relations.
